A Little Background on Keefe Piccolo Company

Jim Keefe and Jan Kinmonth began making Keefe Piccolos in the summer of 2000. They had previously worked at Brannen Brothers for many years. At Brannen, Jim worked as a piccolo maker as well as Vice President and General Manager. Jan worked both as a finisher and manager of the Finishing Department. Jim and Jan are both flute and piccolo players. Jim received his Bachelor's in flute performance at the University of Illinois. Jan was a flute performance major at Oberlin for undergraduate studies and Bowling Green State University for her Master's.

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Over the years, Jim and Jan have made many changes and improvements to the piccolo. There have been large changes such as the addition of the patented C# trill mechanism and the Vented C key. There have been numerous small changes to the scale, head joint designs, material offerings and even care and maintenance. However, the fundamental approach of producing a fine, handmade instrument in the best of the Boston tradition has never changed.

Jim and Jan are very appreciative of the support they have received from the piccolo community over the years and have returned this support. Keefe Piccolos has funded the prize money for the NFA Piccolo Artist

Competition every year since 2010 and supported several other piccolo competitions. It has supported the appearance of numerous Keefe Artists at masterclasses and festivals. In addition, Keefe Piccolos has participated in funding several commissions of piccolo pieces - most recently the Thea Musgrave commission at the NFA 50th in Chicago last year.



Trying a Keefe Piccolo and Head Joints

Being a small company, Keefe Piccolo Company currently has delivery time of several years. However, Keefe piccolo head joints are available immediately. Four head joint styles are available with a range of material combinations. A new head joint can greatly improve the performance of a piccolo.
