What PYP group are you in? How long have you been playing the flute? What other groups do you play with, if any? Who are you studying with now? What school year are you in?

Currently, I play flute in the Portland Youth Philharmonic Orchestra; I auditioned for PYP between the summers of 6th and 7th grade. I began playing flute during 6th grade for the Meadow Park Middle School Band. As of now, I am a sophomore attending Westview Highschool. Along with PYP, I play flute in my school's wind ensemble and direct the marching band as a drum major. I study flute with flutist Corrie Cook: Mrs. Cook plays her instrument in the Vancouver Symphony up in Washington.

What do you love about playing an instrument?

Ever since I was young, music has always been a big part of my life. Whether it be listening to old hits with my father or jamming out in the car with my mom and sister. After playing flute, I received an unexplained comfort from playing my instrument every day. As I progress through high school, the flute has been a great outlet for me; It is always great to pick up my instrument and let the music envelop me. What keeps you motivated to improve? Do you have a favorite practice routine?

For me, the players around me motivate me to improve. When playing in PYP I am always surrounded by incredibly talented musicians who are very dedicated to their craft. Ever since 7th grade, I have always watched these musicians in awe; as I grow as a musician, I always look at those around me. I tend to practice the flute for at least an hour after school. I begin practice with sight-reading, tonal work, and scales. The second half of my playing sessions are dedicated to the repertoire that needs attention.

Favorite flute solo to listen to? (Maybe that piece you listen to over and over again and aspire to play someday?)

A piece I really enjoy listening to is the second movement of the *Flute Concerto* by Jacques Ibert. I know a lot of really talented flute players who have played it for competitions and recitals. One day, I aspire to play it at a high level.

Your favorite flutist(s) to listen to in the whole wide world, and why?

Personally, I really enjoy listening to Jasmine Choi, she makes pieces sound so majestic and smooth, regardless of the difficulty.

Who has helped you most on your musical/flute journey so far, and how?

A lot of people have influenced me and my flute journey. However, my teacher, Mrs. Cook has influenced me a lot: She creates a fun environment to play flute in and always provides cool tips and tricks.
