

# Remembering Matt Doran Reflections from GPFS Member Rebecca Olson September 1, 1921 - August 3, 2016

Several of his pieces are available to GPFS Members through the GPFS Lending Library!



## Our GPFS Library includes some music by local composers, one such composer being Dr. Matt Doran.

Although he was born in Kentucky and spent much of his life in Los Angeles, in 1997 he moved to Vancouver, Washington and remained there until his death in 2016. He wrote many compositions while living in the Northwest. Many ensembles in the area performed his music, such as the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, the Clark College Orchestra and Choir, The Oregon Chamber Players, and even the

Rose City Flute Choir\*. Matt taught flute and piano lessons at his home and had a flute club that met once a month to sight-read flute ensemble music, some of the music being his own compositions. His Vancouver Flute Club still continues today! Many of his hand-written manuscripts were type-set by his Vancouver neighbor.

The flute was Matt's favorite instrument, and he composed many works that included it

Flute and guitar, flute and cello\*, flute/oboe/clarinet, woodwind quartets and quintets, and of course flute and piano, and flute alone.

Our library has two of his flute alone pieces: *Motive and Five Variations*, and *Encore and Scherzo*.


- *Motive and Five Variations* for Solo Flute was written in 2006, but not premiered until 2009. You can listen to the premiere by Centralia, Washington flutist, Franji Mayes, with this link: <a href="https://youtu.be/k-PuBdCezMY">https://youtu.be/k-PuBdCezMY</a>. It's a substantial work, about 8 minutes in length. The haunting motive was taken from his orchestral piece, *Memoirs of Marianne*, written earlier. \* Marianne was Matt's daughter that passed away at the age of 46 from breast cancer. Her death significantly impacted Matt, causing him to abandon his Catholic faith.
- Encore and Scherzo were written in 2013. The Scherzo is very short and includes his trademark trills. Matt was very fond of trills! The last two measures have the flutist trilling while fingering other notes, creating an unusual effect. \*

We also have 4 of his flute and piano works: Piece, Four Movements, and Sonata #13 and #14. *Piece for Flute and Piano* was one of Matt's last compositions, written in March of 2016. It consists of three very short movements, the flute part fitting on just one sheet of paper. It makes uses of our highest B, but is a relatively simple piece that a student could master! According to Matt, *Sonata 14* should be programmed before *Sonata 13* if played on the same concert. He mentioned having heard an orchestra play Shostakovich's 6<sup>th</sup> Symphony followed by his 5<sup>th</sup> Symphony, and that it was better that way!

Our GPFS library also has some of Matt's flute ensemble works. Variations and Scherzo for Large Flute Ensemble was commissioned in 2010 and dedicated to the West Michigan Flute Association. There are two performances of this on YouTube, one by the Long Beach State College flute choir and the other performed in Melbourne, Australia. Our library includes smaller ensemble works, as well: Four Movements for Four Flutes and Piano, Waltz and Variations for Four Flutes and Piano, and Quartet for 3 Flutes and Piano. Matt didn't usually use key signatures, but his Waltz and Variations begins and ends with two sharps. He used a lot of 16<sup>th</sup> note passages in much of his music, as well as triplet sections. His flute ensemble music has a lot of parallel rhythms in the parts, so it's not too difficult to put together. There are also simple, lovely mournful melodies.
