It's the place where Ives gets paired with Gesualdo, where poetry gets paired with Beethoven, where jazz, Irish fiddling, baroque music and anything else that sprouts from the fertile mind of founder Greg Ewer is born. F.O.G. is the place where Greg and friends will continue 45th Parallel's eclectic tradition with concerts that amuse, challenge, provoke, and inspire.

Last, but certainly not least, teaching is gloriously central to their mission. This is something else that GPFS has in common with them – the mission of teaching and the commitment to make certain those students who can't afford lessons have some opportunity to do so.

Teaching the next generation of musicians is also critical to the group's mission. An experiment to give music lessons to students who couldn't afford them has blossomed into an urban success story, fostering confidence, community and an appreciation of beauty from both teachers and students. In the end, it boils down to this: 45th Parallel offers something both simple and complex: Music is nothing less than a marvel of human expression.

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Q&A with Martha Long

How would you describe what 45th Parallel is to a child?

45th Parallel is a group of musicians who are devoted to playing chamber music together. There are five individual ensembles (two string quartets, a wind quintet, a percussion group, and a flexible group for special projects) that present their own concerts throughout the season and come together twice a year to perform as a chamber orchestra. There are also opportunities to perform with musicians from different ensembles--for example, I recently played Amy Beach's Theme and Variations for flute and string quartet and I often perform with one of the cellists as a duo. The range of repertoire spans from the Baroque period, played on period instruments, to brand new works written specifically for 45th Parallel members and everything in between.



Why do you want to be a part of 45th?

I love playing in the orchestra and it will always be my musical home. Chamber music brings a different set of challenges and opportunities, from choosing your own repertoire to using your rehearsal time wisely to choosing what to wear onstage. I always tell my students that just as there is no substitute for private lessons, there is also no substitute for ensemble playing. As a professional, there is no substitute for being one voice in the orchestral tapestry but also no substitute for the simple pleasure of performing chamber music with friends. The two groups serve different needs and purposes within my musical life.

What do you most want GPFS members to know about 45th?

There's something for every type of audience member at 45th Parallel. I can think of recent concerts that included Bach suites on solo baroque violin, a string quartet collaborating with an electric guitarist, concerts that bring together spoken word and new pieces of music, and beautiful performances of standard Classical and Romantic repertoire. If you're new to 45th Parallel, I encourage you to check out our YouTube page (45th Parallel Universe) and watch some of the Friday night concerts that we produced during the pandemic. There are 54 programs to choose from (including several performances by my wind quintet and my own flute recital!) and I'm sure that you'll find something to love. We also love hearing from our audience members, so don't be shy! If there's something that you loved or something that you want to hear, please reach out. Live music is a conversation between the performer and the audience, so we welcome your thoughts and questions.

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
