

We Read: Earth's Wild Music -Celebrating and Defending the Songs of the Natural World by Kathleen Moore (2021, <u>Counterpoint</u> <u>Press</u>)

If, in addition to the flute and music, you love nature and are an advocate for - or curious about - protecting and saving the earth's air, sky, water, forests and animals then this may be a collection of essays for

you. It is not a book I can fully appreciate or read cover to cover, but it is thoughtful, and the angle appeals to my musical self.

Musician Paul Winter says - "Kathleen Moore is an ambassador for listening, and Earth's Wild Music is a guidebook for how this untapped sense can lead us to falling in love with our true home: the world of nature."

The essays attempt to tune us into the soundscapes of nature, to the music that lives around us. It serves to remind us of our moral obligation to engage with nature with our ears, to hear what must be saved from silence. It also encourages us to think about what it would mean to behave in ways on behalf of

the environment that would cause the earth to "sing" more. For Moore, each time something in nature dies as song of the earth goes silent, passing with no hope of reviving the melody.

I think these essays, which are richly descriptive and provocative with just the right touch of science woven into the soundscape of the volume, can inspire composers.
